
The Autism Epidemic

People believe autism is growing wildly because they read about it more.




You find the word "autism"

Person-first language has helped change the words we use. In 1980, the word "autistic" was nearly twice as common as "autism."




4 While "autism" has skyrocketed, the use of "autistic" has grown more slowly.

5 But this is nothing compared to the explosion of language referring to autism as an epidemic. You were 135 times more likely to read about autism as an epidemic in 2011 compared to


just 15 years earlier.

Thankfully, such characterizations have declined lately, reflecting better education on the topic.




Where are all the extra autistic people?
